January Meeting Highlights

The Dolores School Board approved the final budget for the 2019-2020 school year. The final budget of over thirteen million dollars will be submitted to the Colorado Department of Education and submitted on the district website.

The date for graduation was previously changed to better accommodate the needs of the many seniors involved in final competitions. Due to this change, the board voted to revise the current-year calendar. A vote passed to add the Monday following Easter, April 13, back into the calendar rather than taking the day off. The Friday following graduation will be a day off for all students. This date is May 15, 2020. These changes are now reflected on the district website calendar.

The board also approved a donation to Operation Graduation for \$750.00. This program has been established by parents to provide a safe option for their students after graduation.

The board approved the proposed student fees for next year. These fees will be finalized and posted on the website. The only new fees will be for certain Career and Technical Education classes and electives that are offered next year.

STEM in the Toddler Classrooms

In the toddler classroom students talked about the New Year and how different people celebrate this momentous time. Toddlers looked at pictures of fireworks and watched some displays.

The toddlers were able to make their own fireworks using baking soda, vinegar, food dye and confetti. All the children took turns adding the baking soda to the dyed vinegar with a spoon. Each child was given baking soda and vinegar to explore on their own (with supervision).

This activity is part of the cause and effect standard, physical properties of matter, colors, and the scientific method of prediction and observation.

What is the census and when does it happen?

Every 10 years, everyone living in the United States is asked to complete a simple but very important constitutional task: respond to the census. The 2020 Census is a questionnaire that asks a few basic questions, like the age, sex and number of people who live or stay in your home, including young children and newborn babies. The next decennial census starts in March of 2020 and responding is easy, safe, and important.

Why is counting young children important?

Newborn babies and young children under five are often missed in the census. The 2020 Census helps determine which areas qualify for the critical resources that children and families depend on for the next 10 years—basically, an entire childhood! Examples of resources that could be impacted include food assistance, Head Start, childcare, housing support, public schools, early intervention services for children with special needs, children's health insurance, and more. Knowing how many children there are and where they live is essential to getting those services and programs to them. That's why it's so important that every child be counted, even newborn babies.

Your responses to the 2020 Census are safe, secure, and protected by federal law. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics—**they cannot be used against you in any way.** By law, all responses to U.S. Census Bureau household and business surveys are kept completely confidential.

Respond to the 2020 Census to shape the future.

Responding to the census helps communities get the funding they need and helps businesses make data-driven decisions that grow the economy. Census data impact our daily lives, informing important decisions about funding for services and infrastructure in your community, including health care, senior centers, jobs, political representation, roads, schools, and businesses. More than \$675 billion in federal funding flows back to states and local communities each year based on census data.



Your census responses are safe and secure.

The Census Bureau is required by law to protect any personal information we collect and keep it strictly confidential. The Census Bureau can only use your answers to produce statistics. In fact, every Census Bureau employee takes an oath to protect your personal information for life. Your answers cannot be used for law enforcement purposes or to determine your personal eligibility for government benefits.

By law, your responses cannot be used against you.

By law, your census responses cannot be used against you by any government agency or court in any way—not by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), not by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), not by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), and not by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). The law requires the Census Bureau to keep your information confidential and use your responses only to produce statistics.

The law is clear—no personal information can be shared.

Under Title 13 of the U.S. Code, the Census Bureau cannot release any identifiable information about individuals, households, or businesses, even to law enforcement agencies.

The law states that the information collected may only be used for statistical purposes and no other purpose.

To support historical research, Title 44 of the U.S. Code allows the National Archives and Records Administration to release census records only after 72 years.

All Census Bureau staff take a lifetime oath to protect your personal information, and any violation comes with a penalty of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years in prison.
