In the DHS Senior Spotlight Jordan Elder





Technology at DSD

by Mark Baxter The technology department ensures that technology tools are in the hands of our students and educators, fully functional and up to date. When describing the tech department it would easy to discuss the 200Mbps fiber optic internet connectivity, the 700+ Chrome-books, the two computer labs, the district wide printers/copiers, the document cameras, the projectors, the staff laptops, PowerSchool, email accounts, networking, servers, and all the rest of the hardware and software that the school district provides and supports, but the most vital job of the department is supporting student learning and instruction.

Over the years, the Dolores School District consistently puts a high value on technology and technology instruction for students. While we have enough Chrome-books that every student from first grade on has access in classrooms, our tech plan for students goes much further. All elementary students have computer class as a special throughout the year. At the secondary students have required computer classes for graduation, and many technology elective options. Even though children of this generation often access technology from a very young age, we cannot assume this exposure is the same as understanding. Our dedicated and knowledgable tech

teachers focus on students learning to use technology as productivity tools.

In the technology classes, students see and use multiple different types of technology tools including Windows PCs, Macs, Chrome-books, iPads, digital cameras, and video creation and editing tools. Students have access to numerous hardware and software platforms, including professional content creation software, like the Adobe Creative Suite (Photoshop, Illustrator, Acrobat Pro, etc.) That said, the our focus remains on the process more than the specific programs used. We want students to leave high school knowing how to create and manipulate data in spreadsheets (no matter what the program), rather than teaching Excel or Google Sheets specifically. The same goes for document creation, image manipulation, and even programming.

In the technology department I also support the school district's communication goals, managing our phone system, email and our student management software PowerSchool. I also work with the website and the Dolores School District mobile app. I encourage parents to download the Dolores School District app for iPhone or Android to receive notifications from the school directly onto your mobile device. Search the app store or visit <u>https://doloresschools.org/</u> and scroll to the bottom of the page for links to the Dolores SD App.

Technology at the school is a multilevel endeavor. We are constantly trying to manage infrastructure needs, data management, instructional needs, and most importantly student educational needs, all on a budget. Working closely with a supportive administration team and dedicated teachers, Dolores School District's technology plan remains on solid footing and our students receive a well rounded tech experience in technology specific studies and across content areas.

YOUR VOICE YOUR VOTE The board has been busy doing the work of policy making and setting direction. The Dolores School Board approved the calendar for next year. One may see the approved calendar on page 9. They approved a modified calendar based on the ideals of the committee who met last year. The hope is that the calendar provides more consistency for our staff and families in planning.

On Monday, March 2, the school board had an important work session with the architectural firm, civil engineer, and the representatives from the BEST grant at Colorado Department of Education. The board submitted questions to the named individuals and the questions were discussed in the meeting. The board intends to set direction for the district's future in their next monthly meeting on March 12 based on the facts and information they have recently gathered.

Another important decision the board will make in the next meeting is the direction of our kindergarten through eighth grade curriculum. The district has been in a process of curriculum vertical alignment and decisions need to be made in regard to particular use of curriculum. Superintendent Richard presented a particular program for the board to consider which would align our K-8 and utilize the project-based learning methods for science and social studies.

Update From Our Director of Student Nutrition

Student Nutrition...It's all in the name, except that there is a fair amount of mystery and misinformation about how it operates. First, let me make a few important distinctions. Primarily, as the title implies, we provide Nutrition for Students. Sorry adults, you are a secondary consideration.

The USDA and CDE govern the trajectory, standards and guidelines for all Student Nutrition Programs. The department budget operates totally separate from the school's general fund budget. We generate revenue from sales and reimbursement for Free and Reduced meals and in turn the department is responsible for wages, benefits, groceries, equipment, repairs and insurance. Student Nutrition is run as a non-profit business. There is a CDE mandated limit on the amount of profit we are allowed to generate. All of this being said, we provide appealing and nutritious meals twice a day on a shoestring budget.

I am going to take this opportunity to emphasize how important it is for parents to be responsible and keep their students' account balances in good standing. So far, we have fed students meals no matter what their account balance has available. Qualifying for Free or Reduced price meals is a simple process and many will qualify each year (See page 8). SNAP benefits are even

easier to get and families who qualify are categorically eligible for free

meals.

For over 15 years, this department has used the same point of sale for the cafeteria. There have been a lot of changes over the years keeping up with trends and technology. We have added an online payment option and software patches to try to stay current.

The time has arrived to update to a more current system. I have been notified that the old one will no longer be supported because it is based on older technology.

Starting February 18th, the cafeteria started using Meals Plus as our meal system. I am very excited to use this upgrade. It will replace 2 software packages that I am currently using with one encompassing, cloud-based world that is more intuitive at a reduced cost to the department. There will be added interactive features for your families also.

PayPams will be replaced with K12 payment center.com This is an online way to add money to your students' accounts, check balances, monitor activity and set alerts if you choose. The set up will be simple and user friendly. An additional feature will be the Meals Plus App which will encompass the K12 payment center, menus, nutritional information as well as other options. Change is scary and frustrating at times but the more I research **MealsPlus**, the more excited I feel about my ability to serve the community and the students in our cafeteria. Sincerely,

Monthly Blog by Superintendent Lis Richard

"Angela Duckworth is a professor of psychology at the University of Pennsylvania. She has made a special study of the need for children to develop perseverance and selfcontrol, or "grit." She describes girt as a passion and perseverance for very longterm goals: "Grit is having stamina. Grit is sticking with your future, day in, day out, not just for the week, not just for the month but for years, and working really hard to make that future a reality. Grit is living life like it's a marathon, not a sprint." Her research suggests that success and fulfillment in any field often depends more on grit than talent. Grit is largely independent of talent. People with great talent often lack it and fail to make the most of their natural abilities; those with less ability may achieve more because of greater determination and perseverance to achieve at their highest levels. Commitment and persistence are vital factors in life, but they have to be honed by experience: by the disappointments of failure as well as by the rewards of success" (Angela Lee Duckworth, "Transcript of 'Grit: The Power of Passion and Perseverance," TED, April 2014, http:// www.wilderdom.com/fourantidotes.html).

Why would this be a topic of discussion for a blog? It is important for all of us to partner together to help our students develop good grit and perseverance. I watch daily as parents unnecessarily rescue their young person from a situation that could potentially teach them so much. In Jessica Lahey's book "The Gift of Failure," she states, "we have taught our kids to fear failure, and in doing so, we have blocked the surest and clearest path to their Home of the Bears

success. That's certainly not what we meant to do, and we did it for all the best and wellintentioned reasons, but it's Abraham Lincoln once said, "When you reach the end of your rope, tie a knot and hang on." Learning to persevere through trials is important in growing into an adult.

what we have wrought nevertheless. Out of love and desire to protect our children's self-esteem, we have bulldozed every uncomfortable bump and obstacle out of their way, clearing the manicured path we hoped would lead to success and happiness. Unfortunately, in doing so we have deprived our children of the most important lesson of childhood. The setbacks, mistakes, miscalculation, and failures we have shoved out of our children's way are the very experiences that teach them how to be resourceful, persistent, innovative, and resilient citizens of this world."

Certainly one of our collaborative goals is to see our students as vibrant and contributing citizens; however, we have a greater and immediate need to help them navigate through conflict and difficulties. This will help them develop the character needed to be a well-adjusted adult citizens.

Grit comes through struggle. One of our greatest presidents, Abraham Lincoln, learned how to lead through failure. He is remembered for his saying, "When you reach the end of your rope, tie a knot and hang on." He also said, "Life is hard but so very beautiful." May we protect our children in healthy ways and let them grow through the *teacher* of adversity.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT FREE AND REDUCED PRICE SCHOOL MEALS

Children need healthy meals to learn. **Dolores RE-4A** offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs **\$1.50**; lunch costs **\$2.50** (K-6) **\$2.75** (7-12) **Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals.** Reduced price is **\$.00** (*K*-12) for breakfast and **\$.00** (*K*-12) for lunch. **Adult and staff lunch price is \$4.00**. Below are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

1.Who can get free OR REDUCED PRICE meals?

•All children in households receiving benefits from **SNAP**, [the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)] or TANF, are eligible for free meals.

•Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.

•Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.

•Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.

•Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits set forth by the USDA.

- 2HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILDREN QUALIFY AS homeless, MIGRANT, OR RUNAWAY? Do the members of your household lack a permanent address? Are you staying together in a shelter, hotel, or other temporary housing arrangement? Does your family relocate on a seasonal basis? Are any children living with you who have chosen to leave their prior family or household? If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail **the RE-4A District office.**
- 2Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Chuck Soukup PO Box 727 Dolores CO 81323, 970-882-7766
- 2SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE ALREADY APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? **No**, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. If any children in your household were missing from your eligibility notification, contact **Chuck Soukup PO Box 727 Dolores CO 81323, 970-882-7766**
- 2 MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT A NEW ONE? **YES!** Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 2I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC <u>may</u> be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
- 2Will the information I give be checked? **Yes**. We may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report.
- 2If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? **Yes**, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- 2What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: **Chuck Soukup PO Box 727 Dolores CO 81323**, **970-882-7766**
- 2May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced price meals.
- 2What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you <u>normally</u> receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
