Kindergarten - Eighth Grades Adopts New Learning Program



Last spring, our school board approved the adoption of the Core Knowledge Sequence of Learning for our kindergarten through the eighth grade. The implementation of this program begins in the upcoming school year. It will take some time to fully implement the program, but this is an exciting venture for all.

In 2018, our district conducted a curriculum audit of the entire K-12 academic program. One of the major findings of that audit was the need for an aligned program. Our teachers and administration have been working diligently to align our programs both vertically and to state standards. One of the benefits of adopting the Core Knowledge Sequence is the manner in which it is so purposefully vertically aligned.

This premiere learning model is used widely in public, charter, and private schools. The success rate in schools is very impressive. There is extensive research on the program that will be available for view on the school district website.



The Core Knowledge Sequence is a detailed outline of recommended content knowledge and skills to be taught in language arts, history and geography, visual arts, music, mathematics, and science from preschool through grade eight.

The Sequence complements the general skills and objectives typically found in state and local curriculum guides.

The Core Knowledge Sequence provides the blueprint for knowledge-based schooling.

Knowledge-based schooling puts the emphasis of early education on teaching and learning an enabling core of broadly shared knowledge—enabling because it builds strong foundations for later learning and opens doors to effective participation and mutual understanding in the wider society. Learn more about the thinking behind <u>knowledgebased schooling</u>.

The Core Knowledge approach puts knowledge at the heart of schooling.

Specific and Sequenced: Most curriculum standards provide general goals and objectives but offer teachers little guidance about the specific knowledge students should learn in each grade. In contrast, the Core Knowledge approach is to specify, in a clear grade-by-grade sequence, what students need to know.

Excellence and Equity: Only by specifying the knowledge and skills that all children should share can we guarantee equal access to that knowledge. Educational excellence and equity require that every child in a democracy have access to important shared knowledge and language.

Starting Early: It's important to begin building strong foundations of knowledge in the early years. The Core Knowledge approach focuses on preschool through grade eight. In these early years, especially the preschool and elementary grades, schools can do the most to help children lay the groundwork for language development and future success.

School App Used for Screening

Download Today

One of the new requirements for the district in this COVID environment is that we screen anyone entering our buildings. In order to maintain privacy, we are asking parents and staff to assist this process by completing the daily screening through our school app. The screener will be opened on the app soon and made available to anyone who downloads and is in our school system.

The screener will ask only yes or no questions and will be quick and easy. There will be a brief set up process the very first time. Parents will need to identify their students and the school building they attend. Once this process is done, the daily process is seamless.

The screening may be done on the app between 6:00 a.m. and 7:45 a.m. Any students who are not screened will need to go through screening prior to entering their buildings. There will be a designated space for this in each school.

One of the questions will be in regard to temperature. If any family cannot afford to buy a thermometer, simply call the school office and we will arrange for you to receive one for your family. It is a privilege to help in this area.

The app is completely free. This is an invaluable tool of communication for the district. Please allow for the app to send push notifications. This will notify you of needed communications and even emergency notices.

Why are we offering in-person learning?

Our community's health is of the utmost importance. When we had to move to emergency remote learning, our community moved into action. However, emergency remote learning magnified several challenges:

- An Increase in Inequities: Students who had caregivers at home to support learning engaged much better in remote learning than those that came from homes that are currently involved with two or more agencies, students on IEPs, or students who have caregivers that cannot work remotely.
- **Students' Mental Health:** Many caregivers expressed concerns about their child's social emotional or mental health from remaining in isolation.
- **Child Abuse:** Our county's DHS reported a drop in the number of reports of child abuse. There is a great concern that child abuse could still be happening, but intervention has dramatically dropped.
- Economic & Child Care: If our schools remain closed to in-person learning, many caregivers are unable to work and provide for their families. This has serious consequences for families and for our local economy.
- Safe Socialization: Our schools can model, teach, and put into place procedures to socialize safe ways (i.e., social distancing). If schools are not in person, students will find other ways to socialize that may not be practicing health precautions (i.e., meeting at a park or a friend's home).

Academics: Many DSD students need the support that classrooms teachers provide. Some In the Dolores School District, we honor our parent's choice in educating their child. We intend to be a supportive mechanism in the process of education.

students do not engage and learn well through online learning. If students are not allowed to be in-person the implications on their learning could be drastic.

What do some experts say?

"Being isolated at home for months is a very different prospect for an 8-year-old than it is for an 18-year-old. Even kids of the same age have different interests, needs, and personalities, and their responses to quarantine will be different too. Some children who dealt with bullying or social anxiety prior to the pandemic might have found social distancing to be a relief. Not everyone actually wanted to go to prom. But others with mental-health issues or a less-than-happy home environment are more likely to suffer from being out of school or camp. "It's age-dependent, but more so it depends on what actually happens to kids when they are at home," Stephanie Jones, a developmental psychologist at Harvard, told me. "Little kids, in particular, are barometers of family stress." https:// www.theatlantic.com/family/archive/2020/06/howquarantine-will-affect-kids-social-development/613381/

What about parent choice?

In the Dolores School District, we honor our parent's choice in educating their child. We intend to be a supportive mechanism in the process of education. Ultimately, the child belongs to their parent and parents are responsible for the choices they make for their child's education. Because of this, we have made other options available to our families. It is our desire to assist in online learning or to provide a way to livestream the classrooms.

Some families may choose to move away from their local public district. As much as we want to serve each family, we honor this choice.

The home is actually the greatest classroom with the largest effect upon a child. One parent who I greatly respect in our district, often signs emails with this tag line: "Racial justice starts in the home." The first time I read that it nearly brought tears to my eyes. I have spent the last 20 years of my career in public education. There have been occasion during that time when I have personally felt so disrespected for honest and sincere attempts made for helping a student or family. I have been taken back by the accosting nature of some adults for blaming the school for their child's failures or issues. Any sense of justice, equity, education, and morality I believe starts in the home. As a school district, we are to help the efforts that are taking place in the home. We are to continue to partner with the great efforts of moms and dads.

What are the plans going forward?

Beginning in person was a decision made by many. It is with sincerity and intentionality that we believe this is the right decision. There are other options for those who chose this. All indications are showing the overwhelming majority of parents are ready for their children to return to school in person.

We plan to stay abreast of the latest health and safety precautions and do our due diligence to protect our staff and students. We cannot predict the future; however, we have contingency and back up plans if things change. It is our hope that we can continue in our in-person model and slowly lift the different safety protocols as the corona virus subsides. Until then, our plans are posted online.

HEALTHY CHILD CARE COLORADO HAS DEVELOPED A TEMPORARY HEALTH AND SAFETY TOOLKIT FOR LICENSED CHILD CARE CENTERS, FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES, AND SCHOOL-AGE CHILD CARE PROGRAMS IN COLORADO IN RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.

THE FOLLOWING GUIDANCE HAS BEEN DEVELOPED FOR DOLORES TEDDY BEAR PRESCHOOL AND INCLUDES GUIDANCE REQUIRED BY COLORADO LICENSING RULES, COVID-19 PUBLIC HEALTH AND EXECUTIVE ORDERS, NATIONAL, STATE AND LOCAL RECOMMENDATIONS FOR BEST PRACTICES DURING THIS HEALTH EMERGENCY.



- Masks are required for staff caring for children and interacting with parents to the extent possible and as long as it does not impact the health of the adult.
- Masks for children over 3 who are not napping are recommended but not required.
- Children under 3 years of age should never wear a face covering.
- Only staff and children can enter the classrooms.
- Children are dropped off curbside, not inside the building. Staff will escort the children to their classroom. The week BEFORE school starts each parent and their child, will be contacted and a time scheduled to come in to meet the child's teacher and visit the classroom for a little one-on-one time.
- 6-foot spacing marked on floor and/or sidewalk when walking in a line.
- Parents are asked to wear face masks at drop-off and pick-up.
- Children must be screened daily. Parents are asked to screen prior to drop-off. Any student not screened will receive a health screening upon arrival.

• Exclusion Criteria:

- Cough
- Sore Throat
- Fever (100.4 degrees or more) If temperature is 99.2 100.3 monitor throughout the day
- If child has had close contact with someone with COVID-19 or symptoms follow local health department guidance
- All staff will receive health screening upon entering the preschool building.
- Alternate sign in/out procedure is implemented so parents do not have to share pens and clipboards.
- Teachers will remain with their cohort (class) of students throughout the day.
- Limited staff will interact with cohorts for staff and student breaks.
- · Group ratios will be strictly maintained.
- · Toys that cannot easily be disinfected and sanitized will be removed.
- NO food or toys brought from home.
- Family-style meals will be discontinued and all students will be served their meals.
- Proper spacing of six feet between mats and cots during naps. Children are arranged in a head-to-foot configuration. Call 970.739.42.44 Bedding is not shared and is washed weekly and dried using high heat.

Other Information

- All onsite tours are discontinued.
- Non-essential visitors are not allowed in the facility.
- · No special events/guests are scheduled for the program at this time.

The Dolores School District maintains a cafeteria during the school year. Breakfast is served from 8 to 8:25 a.m. Lunch is served from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Ala carte snacks are available to Middle School and High School students during meal times. The actual location of eating is yet to be determined.

We are very fortunate to have a quality and caring staff in our cafeteria. Our Food Service Director is Chuck Soukup, who is a graduate of the California Culinary Academy. Contact him with any questions or suggestions.

Food services include hot lunches and breakfasts, through participation in the National School Lunch Program. An approved lunch is made available for students to meet at least one-third of their daily food requirements.
