It's a simple way of negotiating with kids and for them to learn negotiating skills with friends and teachers as well. Most of the time kids throw a fit because they can't fathom that both parties' needs can be satisfied. They are discouraged because they think they will never get their way. CPS is a way to teach them to have Both empathy for the other party (i.e. you, their teacher, or their friends), AND empowerment for their own leaving our team after having served our district for almost 10 years each. Both have moved out of our area and are looking forward to serving new schools in their new areas. We wish them the best, and we held appreciation celebrations for our staff and students to be able to say goodbye and express their love and gratitude before these beloved employees left to pursue their new adventures elsewhere. Ms. Russell is leaving her 5th grade classroom in the capable hands of Ms. Furse, and Ms. Ramsay is leaving her OT clients in the capable hands of Ms. Guilfoyle. underlying wants and needs.

When there is a conflict, you simply teach them to ask why they want what they want, until you both figure out the "underlying concerns." But why don't you want to do your homework right after school? Is a good example. For the child it's usually because they are too tired after a long day at school, or they are afraid their friends won't be able to play later. For the parent it's usually because they don't trust it will get done and it's their job to make sure the child learns.

So then you brainstorm ways to give the child a break, or make sure they get to play with friends and still prove to the parent they are learning what is needed. Ideas such as: 1-do 3 problems first, then play and finish the rest after dinner. 2-Do homework first one day and play first the next. 3-Do homework with a friend, etc. When you find a solution that meets the underlying concerns of both parties, you give it a shot. If it doesn't work (maybe they get too distracted doing homework with friends, or they get the first three problems wrong every time) you can always try your other ideas, or brainstorm some more.

It reinforces the resilience we have been working on all year: "We haven't found a solution we both like YET. What ELSE can we try? And who is capable of not giving up until we find a good solution? WE are!
