Important Updates:



Hello Little Bear Families!

This week we will continue working on the higher level social skills, in particular, Resisting Negative Peer Pressure! The steps are:

#1. Name the wrong.

- --Oh, that's stealing.
- --That would be mean.
- --That's against the rules.
- --I'll get grounded; my mom doesn't allow that.
- #2. Name something ELSE to do that's BEST.
- --Let's go bake some cookies instead.
- --Let's write a secret nice note to them instead.
- --I learned a new game -or skill ... let me teach it to you!
- --I'd rather build a fort in the snow instead!

A majority of the time, those doing the pressuring will go along with the new alternative activity! If they don't then ...

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#3. Say No and Walk away. Leave the door open (not the literal door, just make it easy for them to still change their mind and still come back and be your friend)!

-- I hope you change your mind. See you later!

--No. I'm going to go ahead and write the nice note. You should try it sometime. It's super awesome to see how happy and confused they get. Let me know if you change your mind. --No. Come play with us when you're ready. It's super fun. --No. You won't be able to play with me if you go through with that and I could use your help. Let me know if you change your mind.

Make sure they don't linger and try to explain why they don't want to do the wrong thing. They will have to moralize and back their friend into a corner where they will feel they can't change their mind. But, if they follow the 3 short steps, most of the time the friend pressuring them will actually change their mind. Some right at first. Others will take the time to think and will change their minds as well. Help your kids practice. Practice times they already have been pressured to do something wrong. Help them practice scenarios from your own life as well.

Remember the "Just Say No!" method of resisting peer pressure has decades of evidence that proves it very rarely works. Why? Because the fear of not belonging trumps the sense of right and wrong almost every time. It's why events like the holocaust can happen. If we teach them to understand this fear, it becomes easier for them to be brave. And, if we teach them to "positive pressure" a few other friends to be brave with them, now they have their own "safe" group where they do belong. And quite often they will be rescuing the original perpetrator of the negative peer pressure from also making a mistake!
