The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) conducts an annual student count in October to determine the number of students in each school district. CDE collects data on the number of students actively enrolled and attending classes on the count day. **This data is used to determine school funding**. October count is one way to ensure that Dolores School District RE-4A receives the appropriate funding amount for our students. As a district, we have worked hard to increase attendance. This is not only because of numbers and student count but also because attendance is important for student academic growth, building relationships, and socialemotional wellness. For the purpose of funding from the state, we would like to accurately report the number of students enrolled at the Dolores District. 

If you do get sick, remember to:

Stay HOME 🏫 if necessary

HOW SICK IS TOO SICK? There are 4 main reasons for children and adults to stay home, according to the CO Department of Public Health and Environment:

- The child or staff member could infect others with a contagious illness, either because of symptoms, a diagnosis, or recent exposure to a contagious illness.
- The child or staff member does not feel well enough to take part in usual activities. For example, a child is overly tired, fussy, or will not stop crying.
- A child needs more care than teachers and staff can give while still caring for the other children.
- The child or staff member has symptoms or an illness on this list, and staying home is required. <u>How Sick is Too Sick?</u>

Some others include, but are not limited to:

- Severe or new cough
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea
- Temperature of 100.4°F or greater. Babies who are 3 months or younger need to see a health care provider right away for a fever of 100°F or higher. Call your health care provider for any fever in an infant aged 6 months or younger.

WHERE TO GET IMMUNIZATIONS: any pharmacy or doctor's office and at the Montezuma County Health Department Vaccine Clinic on Wednesdays, by appointment only.
