

To strengthen our community ties, we invite families to participate in our food drive at the Secondary School from November 1st to 20th. Your contributions will support local families in need during the holiday season.



### **Thanksgiving**



Instructional Spotlight: How Teddy Bear Preschool prepares students for academic and social success

Often we as K-12 educators are unaware of the preparation our students receive in their early education years. Teddy Bear Preschool equips our students with skills to independently problem-solve and navigate social and personal conflicts.

During an observation in October, Miss Elaine and Miss Amanda's class learned how to create a "solution suitcase" with strategies for solving problems. This allows students to independently problem solve instead of always relying on a teacher to provide solutions for them. Miss Evalyn and Miss Karen's class heard a story about scribbles to help them learn how small acts of kindness can make others feel included. Teddy Bear teachers have created structured, organized, classrooms with routines that prepare students for learning, like "listening ears, looking eyes, peaceful body." They also build classroom community with routines like "wishing well," where the class sends positive wishes to their classmates who aren't present that day. Dolores is fortunate to have such an excellent preschool that sets up our students for academic and social success before they begin kindergarten!

### Dolores Elementary School (continued)

I want to take this opportunity to talk a little bit about the attendance letters that you may have received. We have been sending the letters via a message (email) from Alma. We send the letters every 14 days. If your child has missed 10% or more of the days in schools we have sent letters. We have been in school for 47 days, therefore 10% of those days would be 4.7 rounded to 5 days missed. These letters at the elementary level are informational in nature. In severe cases there could be consequences for missing 20% or more of school as deemed by our policy JH, JH-R. We appreciate parents calling in to let us know what is happening with their students. However, even if the days are excused the student has still missed that amount of instructional time and will still receive the letter. The elementary school is responsible for setting good learning standards and habits that will support students throughout their school careers. Attendance is important at the elementary school level because it helps students learn, develop social skills, and build habits that can lead to future success. Here are a few tips from google.ai: Learning: Elementary school learning is sequential, so each day missed is a chance to learn something that will be needed later. Achievement: Students who attend school regularly tend to achieve more than those who don't. Social skills: Students build relationships with their peers and teachers, and learn how to get along with others. Habits: Students develop good habits, discipline, and responsibility, which can help them succeed academically and personally. Engagement: Attendance is a primary indicator of how engaged a student is with their studies. Please know that the letters are to inform you of your student's attendance. The notification of attendance is in our policy and in our handbook. We are working hard as a district to improve in many areas and attendance is one of them.

Looking ahead to November and December. We will be talking about thankfulness, gratitude, and giving. In December, we will work with the character traits of courage and confidence. We are very thankful for our Counselor Mrs. Domagata. She is doing a great job incorporating these character traits into her lessons each month.

### Health and Wellness



With this colder wetter weather, please make sure your student has an extra change of clothing in their backpack in case of unforeseen circumstances or accidents that may arise during the school day.

### **Head Lice**

It's that time of year where our students break out their coats, scarves and hats. Please encourage your child not to share these items along with brushes or any other personal items. Lice is not a danger to your child's health, it is simply an annoying problem that comes around this time of year, so no need to panic. Please know that anyone and everyone can get lice. Getting lice has nothing to do with you being clean or dirty, it only has to do with the fact that you are human. It is very important to check your family regularly for lice this time of year. If you find any live lice or eggs, it is absolutely necessary to treat each person, AND notify the school so that we can effectively and privately assist you with monitoring. The school nurse can assist you with

### Vision & Hearing Screenings

Students' ability to see and ability to learn. The sight and kindergarten, first, second,



hear greatly impacts their hearing of all children in the third, fifth, seventh, and ninth

grades, or children in comparable age groups referred for testing, shall be tested during the school year by the qualified person authorized by the school district, in our case the school nurse.

### Health and Wellness (continued)

We're about halfway through the elementary screenings and will be starting 7th and 9th grades very soon with TeddyBear Preschool screenings in mid November. If you get a letter from the nurse with the screening results please have your child evaluated by the appropriate provider to better assess their needs.

#### **Vaccinations**

Ideally, all students MUST be up to date on their vaccinations at the start of every school year. Colorado law (<u>Board of Health rule 6 CCR 1009-2</u>) requires all students attending Colorado schools and licensed child care centers to be vaccinated against certain diseases, unless an exemption is filed.

If you have any questions or concerns about the current vaccine requirements, please contact the school nurse.

Again, here are some important reminders:


- WASH YOUR HANDS OFTEN WITH SOAP AND WATER



### 7th Grade Field Trip

### **Montezuma Orchard Restoration Project**

The trip began at the Montezuma Orchard Restoration Project, where students learned about the importance of heritage fruit trees in the region. Our 7th graders engaged in hands-on activities, such as finding graft marks and pressing cider. The staff shared insights on the orchard's history, the challenges of climate change, and the significance of biodiversity in local ecosystems.

### Montezuma County Heritage Museum

Following the orchard visit, the group traveled to the Montezuma County Heritage Museum. The museum provided a fascinating glimpse into the area's rich history, featuring exhibits on Native American culture, early settlers, and the agricultural development of the region. Students explored artifacts, photographs, and interactive displays that brought local history to life. The knowledgeable staff guided discussions about the evolution of the community and its significance in Colorado's broader historical context. The visit reinforced the connection between the region's past and present, deepening the students' appreciation for their local heritage.

#### 8th Grade Science

8th grade students just completed a study in chemistry. We learned the Periodic Table of Elements, unique substances, chemical reactions, kinetic energy of particles, states of matter and phase change. The students had to design an experiment and demonstrate phase change of matter: solids, liquids, gasses and plasma. They demonstrated their experiments for a few of the elementary school classes ranging from 2nd grade to 5th grade.

Red Ribbon Week is celebrated in schools to raise awareness about the dangers of drug abuse and to promote a healthy, drug-free lifestyle among students. The goal is to instill a sense of personal responsibility and empower students to stand up against drugs, and violence.
