Spring Fever

Although this winter was quite mild, students and teachers are excited to enjoy the warmer and longer days ahead. Please take a moment to read the Dress Code section of the student handbook:

DRESS CODE

(District Policy <u>JICA</u>)

In order to promote a positive and productive educational environment the following dress code will be enforced. We appreciate the cooperation of parents in supervising their children's attire by making sure students are appropriately dressed before coming to school.

- Students should always come to school in neat and clean attire.
- Please make sure your child is appropriately dressed for the current or impending weather conditions.
- Dresses, skirts, and shorts need to reach mid-thigh length, not shorter than 3 inches above the knee.
- Students should be able to bend over without exposing themselves or their undergarments.
- Pajamas and costumes are allowed only on school approved days for special occasions.
- Sleeveless shirts should have a shoulder strap at least two inches wide.
- Clothing or accessories that are distracting or with inappropriate language, symbols, or advertisements are not allowed. This includes, but is not limited to, references to drugs, alcohol, tobacco, sex, and excessively negative or vulgar sayings.
- Belt lines for pants are at the waist. Underwear must remain below the belt line.
- Students should wear sturdy play shoes to school. Flip-flops, slides, and
- high heels are not allowed due to safety reasons.
- Hats may not be worn indoors.
- Wheeled shoes are not permitted.
- Any clothing and/or accessories otherwise deemed disruptive to the learning environment is not permitted.

Students who come to school inappropriately dressed will be given alternate clothing, or parents will be contacted to bring a change of clothes.

Colorado school districts offer Gifted & Talented programs designed to meet the unique needs of students who demonstrate exceptional abilities or potential at the 95%ile. These programs aim to provide challenging and enriching learning experiences that go beyond the standard curriculum. Areas of Identification include general intellectual ability (GIA), writing, reading, mathematics, science, social studies, and creative productive thinking.

Identification of gifted students typically involves a multi-faceted approach, including cognitive and achievement assessments, teacher recommendations, parent input, and student work samples. Once identified, students may participate in various program models, such as cluster grouping, accelerated classes, and/or independent study courses to name a few. Individualized learning plans, known as Advanced Learning Plans (ALPs), are developed by each gifted student and our GT Coordinator Lisa Baer working together to outline the specific goals and strategies for academic and social-emotional

Spring into Wellness!

March is here, bringing with it warmer weather and longer days! As we transition into spring, it's a great time to focus on our health and well-being.

Spring Allergies - Ah-Choo!

Allergies can be a challenge for many students. Here are some tips to manage them:

- Know your triggers: Identify what triggers your child's allergies (pollen, grass, etc.).
- Monitor pollen counts: Check local weather reports for pollen levels.
- Keep windows closed: Especially during peak pollen hours.
- Wash hands and face: After being outdoors.
- Talk to your doctor: About appropriate allergy medications or treatments.

Protect Your Skin

- With increased sunshine, it's important to protect our skin from harmful UV
 - rays. Remember to:
 - Apply sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher before going outdoors.
 - Wear protective clothing, such as hats and long sleeves.
 - Seek shade during peak sun hours.
 - Please send a water bottle, and apply sunscreen to your student before school.

Use this month to start making informed choices about your food. Some ways to kickstart healthy habits are as follows:

- Plan weekly meals ahead of time.
- Use the nutrition fact labels to help compare ingredients and find foods with higher amounts of vitamins, minerals, and dietary fibers, and low amounts of sodium, saturated fats, and added sugars.
- Use myplate.gov to create healthy, complete meals that cover all 5 food groups.
